Monday & Wednesday Courses

English / Language Arts

Fundamentals of English (Grades 6-7) (Byrd)

Description:

Introductory composition, literature, grammar, and vocabulary.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students can expect an average of four hours of reading and composition outside the classroom per week.

Prerequisites:

6th-grade reading level. New students will be required to participate in placement testing. New students must register for and attend the HRM Writing Boot Camp (new students only). Students who previously participated in the Elementary Academy may have the placement and Writing Boot Camp waived on the teacher's recommendation.

Intermediate English 1 & 2 (Grades 7-9) (Solberg or Kelly)

Description:

Intermediate essay writing, literature interpretation, grammar, vocabulary, and study skills. This is a twoyear cycle covering both general and world literature.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students must read approximately 50-60 pages of a

given novel weekly, completing study guides or other handouts as assigned. In grammar, students will complete exercises or activities in the free NoRedInk online program with their writing to improve usage and fluency. Writing will include informal and formal short assignments, two essays, and a research paper in the spring. In-class discussions are essential; students must demonstrate collegial respect and participate fully.

Prerequisites:

7th-grade reading level. New students will be required to participate in placement testing. New students must register for and attend the HRM Writing Boot Camp (new students only).

High School English 1 & 2 (Grades 9-12) (Carman)

Description:

High school-level essay writing, literature analysis, grammar, and vocabulary. This two-year cycle covers American Literature up to 1877 and American Literature since 1877.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students should expect to read 2-5 chapters in the assigned literature selection per week; accompanying assignments will be given to assess comprehension of the material. Class discussion and note-taking will be required as part of the student's classroom experience. Sentence Openers and Dress Ups are expected to be memorized and utilized in the writing process. 2-3 essays will be assigned throughout the first and second semesters. In addition, a research paper will be assigned during the second semester, and the teacher will direct each step according to set due dates.

Prerequisites:

Three years of Middle School English/Language Arts or the equivalent. 9th-grade reading level. New students will be required to participate in placement testing. New students must register for and attend the HRM Writing Boot Camp (new students only).

High School English 3 & 4 (Grades 10-12) (Solberg)

Description:

College-preparatory level composition, literary and rhetorical analysis, grammar and usage, and vocabulary. This is a two-year cycle covering both British and European literature.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students are expected to assume responsibility for their learning in all areas: reading, vocabulary, writing, and class discussions. Vocabulary study will be primarily literature-based. Students may read 50-75 pages a week, completing handouts or other literature-related work concurrently. Students will also read nonfiction works and complete rhetorical analysis informally and in essays to prepare for college-level reading and writing. In the fall, students will write two complete essays, one of which may be in class; in the spring, students will write an entire essay and a researched argument.

Prerequisites:

Two years of HRM English 1 & 2 or equivalent. New students will be required to participate in placement testing. New students must register for and attend the HRM Writing Boot Camp (new students only).

Spanish 1 (Grades 8-12) (Sargent)

Description:

For students in grades 9-12 and advanced 8th graders. This course focuses on studying language development, vocabulary, grammar, and culture, including the Spanish language in context, while developing speaking, listening, reading, and writing skills.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students should expect approximately 3 hours of outside work per week.

Prerequisites:

High school reading level.

Spanish 2 (Grades 10-12) (Sargent)

Description:

Study of language development, vocabulary, grammar, and culture; emphasis will be on biliteracy as reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills will also be included.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students should expect approximately 3 hours of outside work per week.

Mathematics

Beginning Math (Grades 6-7) (Walker)

Description:

Topics taught include reviewing whole numbers, fractions, decimals, percents, simple geometry, units of measure, probability, and graphs.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students must complete practice problems for 1-3 sections covered each class period. Homework should average 1 hour daily, Monday – Friday for average students. Take-home tests will be given at the end of each unit.

Prerequisites:

Completed 5th-grade math or the equivalent. New students will be required to participate in a math interview. The interview may be waived for those who have taken Math C with the Elementary Academy.

Intermediate Math (Grades 7-8) (Walker)

Description:

Topics taught include fractions, decimals, percents, geometry, units of measure, probability, graphs, and equation solving (beginning pre-algebra).

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students must complete practice problems for 1-3 sections covered each class period. Homework should average 1 hour daily, Monday – Friday for average students. Take-home tests will be given at the end of each unit.

Prerequisites:

Completed 6th-grade math. New students will be required to participate in a math interview.

Pre-Algebra (Grades 6-8) (Miller)

Description:

Review all arithmetic concepts, introductory algebra and related topics, and geometry concepts.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students must complete practice problems for 1-3 sections covered each class period. Homework should average 1 hour daily, Monday – Friday for average students. Expect five tests (typically a take-home test given on Wednesdays), 1-2 in-class projects, and a comprehensive final exam each semester.

Prerequisites:

Completed 7th-grade math or the equivalent. New students will be required to participate in a math interview.

Algebra 1 (Grades 8-10) (Miller)

Description:

Students will solve first- and second-degree equations, which include fractions, decimals, radicals, and absolute value expressions. They will solve word problems, graph two-variable equations, and graph inequalities.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students will be assigned practice problems for 1-2 sections covered every class period. Homework due the next class meeting should average 1-2 hours for average students. Take-home tests will be given at the end of each chapter, plus comprehensive final exams for each semester.

Prerequisites:

Completed Pre-Algebra or the equivalent. New students will be required to participate in a math interview.

Algebra 2 (Grades 9-12) (Hamel)

Description:

Techniques for solving and graphing any equation or relation—covering logarithmic and exponential.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Homework is assigned every class period. Time varies based on ability and class time used. 2-4 tests per grading period, with most being take-home tests. Wednesday's assignment will be lengthier, and take-home tests will also be given on Wednesday.

Prerequisites:

Completed Algebra 1. New students will be required to participate in a math interview.

Geometry (Grades 9-12) (Bahler)

Description:

This class covers the basic concepts of plane geometry—parallel and intersecting lines, triangles, quadrilaterals, and circles. Honor-level assignments will include assignments integrated with algebra concepts consistent with the type of geometry problems that appear on the SAT for college admission. Students (with parental consent) can choose to follow the standard or Honors level track.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. The homework assigned for every class period should take 1-2 hours. There will be weekly quizzes and texts approximately every 5 lessons. Advanced Students will need to memorize pertinent definitions, postulates, and theorems.

Completed Algebra 1. New students will be required to participate in a math interview.

Pre-Calculus (Grades 11-12) (Kossa)

Description:

Principles of logic and step by step problem solving. Mastery of concepts presented in Algebra 2. Trigonometry, including laws with sine, cosine, and tangent. Graphing in both degrees and radians and use of the unit circle. This course will help solidify concepts for a college algebra or college pre-calculus class.

Expectations:

Students should expect to have an average of 1 ½ hours of homework per class period. Quizzes will be given periodically. A semester exam will cover all sections taught in that semester.

Prerequisites:

Completed Algebra 2 and Geometry. New students will be required to participate in a math interview.

History / Social Studies

Middle School: Ancient World History (Grades 6-8) (Czarnik)

Description:

The study of world history of the Greeks and the Romans from a Christian perspective.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Weekly reading assignments and homework should require at most 2 hours per week. Projects, quizzes, and tests will be assigned periodically.

Prerequisites:

6th-grade reading level.

Geography (Grades 9-12) (Lawrence)

Description:

The study of various cultural regions for a Biblical understanding of the earth, its people, and its resources.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Daily reading assignments and homework averaging 1 hour per class period. A country project each grading period will consist of a presentation and food from the chosen country. Maps and quizzes conclude each continent.

High school reading level.

High School: World History (Grades 9-11) (Byrd)

Description:

A survey course from the beginning of human history to the present time.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students will read $\frac{1}{2}$ - 1 chapter a week, complete comprehension questions, weekly mapwork, and take weekly quizzes or tests. In addition, students will

complete two to four projects during the year. Homework should take about an hour a day for average students.

Prerequisites:

High school reading level. Capable of organizing notes and thoughts from class lectures and expressing these ideas on tests and assignments.

Government (Grades 10-12) (Lawrence) - Fall Semester

Description:

A fall semester class. Study of the foundations, structures, and functions of the political and governmental system of the United States from a Christian perspective.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Regular assignments require 1-2 hours per class period.

Prerequisites:

Upper high school reading level. Capable of organizing notes and thoughts from class lectures and expressing these ideas on tests and assignments.

Economics (Grades 10-12) (Lawrence) - Spring Semester

Description:

A spring semester class. This course aims to help students understand how economics plays a part in their daily lives and how it affects the world around them from a Christian perspective. The course introduces the fundamental principles of economics, such as supply and demand, scarcity, opportunity cost, and economic incentives. Students learn about the basics of microeconomics and macroeconomics, the various economic systems in the world, the dangers to our free market system, and the effects of government intervention on the economy. There is an entrepreneurial project where students learn to put what they have learned into practice. The course also includes a personal finance unit where students gain insight into managing their money wisely by learning topics like budgeting, credit, debt, and financial planning.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. One hour of studying per class period. Quizzes at the end of each chapter. A one-month Economics small business project and presentation in the spring.

Art History (Grades 8-12) (Lawrence) - Spring Semester

Description:

In this one semester course, students will learn about artists and the history behind their work as they travel from the Romance Period – World War II. They will learn to sketch and appreciate art. This course will include at least one trip to Houston area art museums.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher.

Prerequisites:

8th-grade reading level

No book purchase required. *Workbook will be printed by HRM and a \$10 printing fee will be included on the invoice.*

Science

Health and Fitness (Grades 6-8) (Cowan)

Description:

Discover how different body systems function and work together to maintain health. Build strength, flexibility, and endurance through physical exercise. Learn about nutrition and how foods fuel the body. Assemble a first aid kit and create emergency plans. Grow and develop the tools for healthy interpersonal relationships and confidence in handling peer pressures. Build upon the skills needed to honor God by making a lifetime of healthy choices. Weekly classes will be reinforced with scripture, fitness exercises reinforcing the topics, and hands-on activities.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. This course will be divided into four quarters: Exercise, Nutrition, Personal Health, Environmental Health and Safety. Each component will conclude with a comprehensive exam. Homework will include a home exercise routine and a project research and preparation. For fitness activities, students must be dressed for and participate in the activities planned for the day, including seasonally appropriate, modest, loose-fitting clothing and tennis shoes.

Able to participate in physical group activities. 6th-grade reading level. Able to write a short report.

Middle School: Earth & Life Science (Grades 6-7) (Hamlin)

Description:

Examination of the scientific method, designing experiments, and studying simple machines, archaeology, geology, paleontology, biology, human anatomy, and physiology.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students must read and answer Summary Module questions at the end of each chapter in 2 weeks. Labs are scheduled weekly, and take-home tests will be administered at the end of each chapter. Students will have a few projects to create at home and present in class.

<u>Prerequisites:</u>

Completed 5th-grade math; 6th-grade reading level; 10+ years of age suggested.

Middle School: Zoology (Advanced 6th Grade, 7-8) (Sargent)

Description:

This class is designed for grades 7-8 with some advanced 6th graders. An Introduction to the study of animals and invertebrates. Detailed vocabulary and classifications will challenge your student as we learn about God's creation. Labs and dissections will give a hands-on approach to learning and practical application for our studies. Biomimicry studies how we have been inspired by God's creation to use imitators of His design for our purposes. For example, a natural sponge versus a synthetic sponge.

Expectations:

In addition to the two days of face-to-face classes, students are expected to work at least two more days under the supervision of the homeschool teacher. Students will need to read and answer the Summary questions for each unit. Labs are scheduled, and take-home tests will be administered. Students will also have end-of-the-unit projects or reports that will count for a quiz grade and are to be created at home and presented in class.

Biology (Grades 9-12) (Garrou)

Students must be engaged and actively participate during all class and lab activities. An appropriate maturity level and ability to work independently and in groups is required. Graphic Design 1 (Grades 6-12) (Thomas) – Fall Semester
